Beirut, Lebanon- 19/04/2012 - The following seven events will be taking place at the American University of Beirut in the coming days:

Lecture on the "digital occupation" of Palestine

The Center for American Studies and Research is organizing a lecture entitled "Digital Occupation: Cellular Im/Mobilities in Palestine-Israel," by Helga Tawil-Souri, from the Department of Middle East and Islamic Studies at NYU, Abu Dhabi, and Institute for Palestine Studies.

The lecture will be held on April 22, 2013, 6-8 pm, in West Hall Auditorium B.

The talk will highlight the impossibility of making a telephone call between four places less than 10 kilometers apart in Palestine-Israel. It will demonstrate how infrastructures and hitech networks are political and territorial processes; and in the case of Palestine-Israel are material manifestations of the conflict itself.

Helga Tawil-Souri is an associate professor of media, culture, and communication at New York University. Her work focuses on issues of spatiality, technology, and politics in the Middle East, with a particular focus on cultural/technological bordering mechanisms in contemporary Israel-Palestine. Her publications have analyzed different aspects of contemporary cultural politics, including the internet, telecommunications, television, film, and videogames, as well as physical markers such as ID cards and checkpoints.

City Debates 2013

The Department of Architecture and Design is organizing the annual Masters in Urban Planning and Policy/Masters in Urban Design programs' annual conference, "City Debates 2013," to be held on April 22-24, 2013, in the Architecture Lecture Hall.

On Apr 22 at 6:30pm, Professor Neema Kudva will deliver the opening keynote address, entitled "Critical Interventions: Advancing Equity in the Informal City."

City Debates is an annual conference that brings together professionals, academics, and students from Beirut and beyond to explore issues of contemporary relevance to the

urbanization of the region. Over the past few years, City Debates has addressed issues such as cultural heritage and the politics of the present, security of/in the city, and emerging practices in urban design.

Titled "Rethinking Informality: Design Tactics/Planning Strategies," City Debates 2013 will address the theme of informal spatial production as it materializes in different scalar levels and within multiple contexts of the Middle-East and beyond. By bringing together scholars, practicing planners and designers, as well as activists engaged in a reflection about the spatial production of informal settlements, their changing position in ever-growing cities, and their relation to both the agricultural and urban landscapes at the intersection of which they often stand, the event seeks to articulate a critical discourse about planning and design that goes beyond the traditional/professional understandings of these disciplines. Case studies will be taken from Lebanon, Syria, Jordan, Palestine, Egypt but also India, Columbia, Germany, France, the United States, and more to draw parallels across national contexts. In light of the centrality of forced population displacement movements in our region, special attention is given in refugee camps as key sites of informality.

Lecture on the politics of global English

The Anis Makdisi Program in Literature is organizing the 2013 Anis Makdisi Memorial Lecture, entitled "The Politics of Global English: From Kipling to K-Maro," by David Damrosch, Harvard University. The lecture will take place on April 25, 2013 at 6pm in Assembly Hall.

The spread of globalization has led many to fear that the world's cultures are increasingly melting into a "global babble" dominated by global English and American popular culture. Examples such as the early experiments by Rudyard Kipling, contemporary works by Tibetan postmodernist Jamyang Norbu, and Lebanese-Canadian hip-hop artist K-Maro reveal how English is being warped into a creative mode of counter-communication, at once local and global in expression and audience

David Damrosch is the distinguished Ernest Bernbaum Professor of Comparative Literature, Chair of the Department of Comparative Literature at Harvard University, past President of the American Comparative Literature Association, and an international authority in his field. His books include: What Is World Literature? (2003), The Buried Book: The Loss and Rediscovery of the Great Epic of Gilgamesh (2007), How to Read World Literature (2009). He is also the general editor of the Longman Anthology of World Literature (2004, 2009), coeditor of The Princeton Sourcebook in Comparative Literature (2009), and founding director of the Institute for World Literature
