## Lecture on media and crowdsourcing

The Department of Sociology, Anthropology & Media Studies at AUB is organizing a lecture entitled "The Future of Media: Does crowd-sourcing = exploitation? An anthropological view," by Ian Condry, cultural anthropologist and professor from MIT's Comparative Media Studies Department.

The lecture will take place on March 28 from 12.30pm to 2pm in West Hall, Auditorium A.

Abstract: Many of today's leading media companies - Facebook, Twitter and much more - provide platforms for participation and depend on "the crowd" for content creation. Is crowd-sourcing a new form of exploitation? Shouldn't people who provide value to these companies be compensated for their labor? This talk will explore the emerging, and sometimes paradoxical, ethics of crowd-sourced media worlds, with examples from Japanese popular culture and US social media.

From the diverse voices of young Shiite Muslims searching for places to hang out, to the Hezbollah officials who want this mediasavvy generation to be more politically involved, to the religious leaders worried that Lebanese youth are losing their moral compasses, *Leisurely Islam* provides a sophisticated and original look at leisure in the Lebanese capital.
