Preface

Dear Reader,

It is a great honor to write this message for the Faculty of Agricultural and Food Sciences' (FAFS) Annual Report. As you know, the 2016-2017 academic year marked a decade of outstanding Faculty achievements in all areas of teaching, research and service under the tenure of Dean Nahla Hwalla, to whom we at FAFS are deeply endebted for her leadership, commitment, and dedication throughout the period of her tenure. We look forward to continued excellence as we embark on new strategic initiatives and priorities in the coming years under the leadership of the new Dean of the Faculty, Dr. Rabi Mohtar.

During the past year, the Faculty made unprecented progress on many fronts, most notable of which was in fund raising to support the Faculty and its students and academic programs. The Faculty secured re-accreditation of its Nutrition and Dietetics Coordinated Program; launched new graduate programs; completed undergraduate program revisions in alignment with the guidelines of professional accrediting agencies; and engaged in research and outreach activities that promoted the impact and visibility of FAFS. Additionally, in September 2016, FAFS celebrated AUB's 150th Anniversary by organizing three conferences under the theme Together towards a Sustainable Community: 1) Nutrition and Food: Ongoing Journey for Better Health, 2) Celebration of Food and Nutrition Security in the MENA, and 3) Arab Women: Keepers of the Land.

Academic programs contributed an important part of FAFS' achievements this year. The Nutrition and Dietetics Coordinated Program (NDCP) received full re-accreditation by the US based ACEND (Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics), under the International Dietitian Education (IDE) program standards, after a rigorous review and a site visit by the ACEND external review team. The program was commended for its 100% pass rate on the US RD exam and since receiving the original accreditation in 2013. The NDCP remains the only program in Lebanon and the region, and the third outside the USA, to achieve this prominent recognition. The AGRI department completed its revision of the undergraduate Agriculture curriculum in alignment with ABET guidelines and requirements; the LDEM department members were engaged in the completion of a self-study on the BLA program in preparation for an external review expected to take place during AY 2017-2018 for the program's reregistration at NYSED and for the intended application for ASLA (American Society of Landscape Architects) accreditation.

FAFS faculty continued their outstanding research efforts, maintaining their leading role as experts in Lebanon and the region. Several members were recognized for noteworthy contributions to advances in scientific research: Dr. Hadi Jaafar won the **CA and CC Rebeiz Award for Agricultural Research** for his paper entitled Impact of the Syrian conflict on irrigated agriculture in the Orontes Basin, published in the International Journal of Water Resources Development. The ENPI Medalgae project,

conducted in Lebanon by FAFS (Dr. Yusuf Abou Jawdah) and ALMEE (Lebanese Association for Energy Saving and for the Environment), won the national **Energy Globe** award for establishing a delivery chain for microalgae to ensure its use for the production of biodiesel. Dr. Nahla Hwalla was also honored among women leaders in Lebanese Universities and research pioneers by the **National Initiative for the Centennial of Greater Lebanon** to mark the 96th anniversary of the declaration of the State of Greater Lebanon in September 1920. Dr. Yaser Abunnasr received the **AUB's Teaching Excellence Award** in May 2017.

The Faculty, in line with its strategy to strengthen communication and promote interaction with the professional community and stakeholders, was honored with an additional member of its External Advisory Board (EAB): Mr. Khaled Sinno (founder of Karma Lebanon), who joined other current members: Dr. Lamya Tannous Khuri, (Professor of Nutrition), Mr. Michel Bayyoud (Founder and CEO, Boecker Group), Mr. Khaled Miqdadi (Director of Agrimatco) and Mr. Nabil De Freij (Minister), Dr. Khalil Melki (Partner and General Manager, Unifert Company, SAL), Mr. Musa Freiji (Owner and President of TANMIA Agricultural Development Company) and Mr. Rapheal Debbane (Chairman, Debbane Saikali Group).

This is but a snapshot of the busy, productive academic year of 2016-2017. On the following pages, you will find detailed information about each of these activities, as well as much more regarding additional initiatives and activities.

I offer a special thank you to all our faculty and staff for their hard work in support of academic excellence, to all our students for their outstanding efforts, and to each of you, members of the FAFS family of friends and alumni, for your continued support.

Actions: The Committee held 10 meetings during 2016-2017. The following actions were taken:

- 1) Capital Budget: Approved priority requests from FAFS Departments and AREC for the 2017-2018 capital budget.
- 2) Graduate Assistants: Approved the appointment of graduate assistants in various FAFS Departments for Fall, Spring and Summer terms. The committee

- stressed that there may be financial repercussions for offering full graduate assistantships to the graduate students of certain programs.
- 3) Space: The committee approved plans for renovation of the Metabolic Kitchen Lab, room 408. The committee also approved the layout and design of the AREC Cafeteria, generously donated by the President's club. The committee approved the relocation of the part-timers of AGRI and NFSC to room 306 and of the graduate assistants of AGRI and NFSC to room 206. The committee also approved: expanding the size of conference room 325 to that of 310; converting the available space of studio 329 into 6 offices; relocating ESDU to room 306; converting offices 308A, 308B and 308C into a conference room similar to 310 and with a moveable separator between conference rooms to offer flexibility to become conference room with the capacity for more than 50 people at a given time.
- 4) AREC meals: In response to student complaints about AREC meal plans, AREC administration and the committee members agreed to dismiss the AREC meal fees and allow students to provide meals for themselves.
- 5) AGRI Vacant Faculty Lines: The Committee recommended that AGRI reconsider the current five vacant lines in favor of a new departmental strategy that parallels the ABET requirements.
- 6) Teaching Load and student enrollment: The underload of certain faculty members was discussed and recognized as financially unsustainable. As this is considered to be directly related to the dropping enrollment figures, FAFS administration will actively develop student recruitment efforts.
- 7) FAFS Students and Alumni Conference: The committee agreed to launch a FAFS Students alumni conference, honoring alumni and encouraging students to present projects and papers.

Actions: Several committee meetings were held during the academic year 2016-2017; the following actions were taken:

1) Course offerings and introduction of new courses

The Committee reviewed and approved the course offerings submitted by the respective departments for spring 2016-17, summer 2016-17 and fall 2017-18. The committee also approved the following new courses in Agriculture and Nutrition:

2) Eligible students to go to AREC

Nineteen Agriculture program students were deemed eligible by the ACC to go to AREC during the spring semester of 2016-17; classes began, as scheduled, on February 27, 2017.

3) New Agriculture Curriculum for ABET Accreditation

The Committee approved the Agriculture curriculum for ABET accreditation and recommended that the faculty change the name from "BS in Agriculture and Diploma of Ingenieur Agricole" to "BS in Agricultural Engineering".

4) Academic status

Based on AUB probation rules and regulations, the Committee acted to drop 4 students during academic year 2016-17. Four students were placed on strict probation, and six were removed from probation.

5) Awarding BS degrees

The Committee recommended awarding the BS degree to 134 students, distributed as follows: 40 in Nutrition and Dietetics, 14 in Nutrition and Dietetics – Coordinated Program, 15 in Food Science and Management, 36 in Landscape Architecture and Diploma of *Ingenieur Agricole*, 30 in Agriculture and Diploma of *Ingenieur Agricole*, and 14 in Agribusiness.

Actions: The Committee met six times during the academic year 2016-2017, taking the following actions:

1) Program of study and thesis titles

The Committee reviewed and approved the program of study and thesis titles for 24 students, distributed as follows: 5 from NUTR, 7 from FTCH, 1 from ECOM, 1 from AGEC, 3 from IRRG, 3 from RCODE, 2 from ANML, 1 from FSEC and 1 from PLPT.

2) Acceptance of graduate students

The Committee accepted 124 students from among 173 applicants. 45 of the accepted candidates enrolled as follows: 8 Nutrition; 8 Food Technology; 4 Plant Protection; 2 Poultry Science; 4 Irrigation; 3 Agricultural Economics; 6 Food Security; 4 Ecosystem Management and 6 Rural Community Development.

3) Petitions

The Committee acted on 6 petitions from students, the majority of which involved changing status from prospective graduate to regular graduate, transferring from one major to the other, withdrawing from a course, transferring courses, and changing thesis title.

4) Awarding the MS degree

The Committee recommended awarding the MS degree to 20 students in their respective majors: 8 in Nutrition, 4 in Food Technology, 2 in Ecosystem Management, 1 in Animal Science, 1 in Plant Science, 1 in Poultry Science, 2 in Agricultural Economics and 1 in RCODE.

The Committee met twice during the Academic year 2016 – 2017. Members discussed disciplinary actions and FAFS awards and recommended the following to the FAFS Dean:

- 1) Disciplinary Actions: The Committee recommended granting a Dean's Warning to one undergraduate student who violated the "Student Code of Conduct" by attempting to cheat in the AGSC 284 final exam during the spring semester.

A. Academic Matters

Faculty Recruitment and Count

The total Faculty Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) for the academic year 2016/2017 (based on fall data) was 43.30, of which 30 were full-time faculty with professorial rank (12 professors, 6 associate professors, and 12 assistant professors of which 3 were visiting assistant professor).

Accreditation, Program Reviews and New Programs

Academic Program Accreditation and Review

- Nutrition and Dietetics Coordinated Program (NDCP) received full re-accreditation by the USA ACEND (Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics) under the International Dietitian Education (IDE) program standards and following rigorous review and a site visit by the ACEND external review team. The program was commended for its 100% pass rate on the US RD exam since receiving initial accreditation (2013). NDCP is proud unique at the national, regional and international levels; it is also the only program in Lebanon, in the region, and only the third outside the USA to achieve this prominent recognition
- **Agriculture Program:** (AGRI) completed a revision of its undergraduate Agriculture curriculum in alignment with ABET guidelines and requirements. The revised curriculum is currently awaiting faculty and upper administration approval
- Bachelor of Landscape Architecture: LDEM completed its self-study on the BLA program in preparation for an external review, expected during fall 2018 for the program's re-registration at NYSED, and to apply ASLA (American Society of Landscape Architects) accreditation

The AUB Diet and Nutrition Clinic was launched at CHSC under the administration of NFSC.

FAFS space made available following relocation to Reynolds Building was used to satisfy part of FAFS faculty office space and classroom needs. Six new offices were created for new and incumbent faculty. FAFS unified the location for the NFSC/AGRI part-timers and the NFSC/AGRI graduate assistants. During the academic year, FAFS renovated and refurbished Lab 502, the feeds and feeding lab, and converted studio 210 into a state of the art computer lab, primarily for hands-on learning by NFSC students.

Prof. Abou Jawadah spoke in favor of the new name as improving the likelihood of ABET accreditation, given it contains the word "Engineering". Faculty members decided to defer action on the name pending further clarification from the Ministry of Education and Higher Education, Order of Engineers and Architects, and AUB



B. Student Statistics

Student Enrollment (2016-2017)

The total FAFS undergraduate enrollment was 498, comprising: Nutrition and Dietetics (133), Nutrition and Dietetics-Coordinated Program (48), Food Science and Management (79), Landscape Architecture (90), Agriculture (85), and Agribusiness (63). Four undergraduate programs (NTDT, NDCP, AGRI and BLA) witnessed an average 10% decline in enrollment, due to a 29% drop in the overall enrollment of new students at the Faculty in all FAFS majors (AGRI, AGBU, FSMT, NTDT and LDAR).

The total graduate enrollment was 96, distributed as follows: NFSC (45), AGRI (23), LDEM (8), FSEC (6) new program, the interdisciplinary Rural Community Development (RCODE) program (12), and visiting students (2).

At the graduate level, enrollment improved from 77 in 2015-2016 to 96 in 2016-2017. This is attributed to the introduction of the new Food Security program and the increased enrollment in RCODE.

Historical Perspective (2016-2017)

Academic Year 2014-2015 had the peak enrollment during the past 5 years. Undergraduate enrollment during the period is shown in Table 6. The considerable change in the undergraduate enrollment (498) compared to 2014-15 (547) is attributed to fewer newly enrolled students in AYs 2015-2016 (98) and 2016-17 (76), than in AY 2014-2015 (117). The decline is reflected primarily in AGRI, AGBU, FSMT and BLA.

Graduate enrollment decreased from 111 students in 2012-13 to 96 in 2016-17, however there has been tremendous improvement over the last three years with the introduction of the new Food Security program and the increase enrollment in RCODE. Student Admissions (2016-2017)

Undergraduate New Applicants

During AY 2016-2017, a total of 1706 new applications were received. Of these, 34% were accepted, and 14% of those actually enrolled. In the fall semester, the yield of admittance was 13% (69 enrolled among 542 accepted students). In the spring semester the yield of admittance was 38% (13 enrolled from 34 accepted students), representing a significant decrease in the number of enrolled undergraduate students (82 students) compared to the previous year (2015-2016: 98 students) and most noticeable within AGBU, AGRI and FSMT programs. Nonetheless, the yield of AY 2016-2017 (14%) was higher than the previous AY 2015-2016 (11%). Table 8 shows the numbers and percentages of new undergraduate students applying to FAFS programs, including those admitted and enrolled in fall and spring 2016-2017.

Undergraduate Transfer Applicants

During AY 2016-2017, a total of 245 transfer applications were received and among these, 155 (63%) were accepted; 54 (35%) of whom enrolled. Graduate Applicants

During AY 2016-17, a total of 141 graduate applications were received and 103 (73%) were accepted. 41 (40%) of those accepted enrolled. The number of enrolled new graduate students grew from 29 in 2015-16 to 45 in 2016-17, due to the introduction of the new Food Security program and the increased enrollment in RCODE. Table 10 shows the numbers and percentages of graduate students who applied to FAFS, were admitted, and who enrolled.

Graduation (2016-2017)

FAFS graduated 134 undergraduate students in 2016-2017. These were distributed over the majors as follows: Nutrition and Dietetics (38), Nutrition and Dietetics—Coordinated Program (14), Food Science and Management (16), Landscape Architecture (21), Agriculture (30), and Agribusiness (15). The number of undergraduate graduates increased over the last five years.

FAFS also graduated 20 students in its graduate programs as follows: Nutrition (8), Food Technology (4), Ecosystem Management (2), Agricultural Economics (2), Plant Science (1), Animal Science (1), Poultry Science (1) and Rural Community and Development (1). The average number of M.S. graduates over the last five years was 27. Tables 11 and 12 show the distribution of graduated students in the FAFS disciplines and during the past five years.

Highlights

- The AUB community, faculty members, and students gathered at the Annual AREC DAY on its 61st Anniversary on April 23, 2017
- Dr. Haidar, AREC Director, invited AG professors and staff and AREC students to a Field Day on the afternoon of Thursday July 20, 2017, to observe student's projects. The session was followed by a BBQ lunch in a Bedouin tent on the AREC green turf
- As part of AREC's mission, and to provide agricultural and experiential support
 to the community, Dr. Haidar, AREC director, invited the heads of the Union of
 Municipalities of Western Baalbeck to lunch on May 24, 2017. They were briefed
 on AREC's role in agricultural development in the region and on current major

- Dr. Hadi Jaafar, Department of Agriculture, AUB, held a one day reflection workshopt AREC in collaboration with the International Institute of Environment and Development (IIED) (Friday October 26, 2016)

Highlights on ESDU Activities from September 1, 2016 to August 31, 2017:

During the AY 2016–17, ESDU continued several on-going projects and implemented new projects with a total budget of \$280,078 (US) from multiple international donor agencies.

Regional Networking

"KariaNet" Knowledge Access for Rural Inter-connected Areas Network is a regional network funded by IDRC and IFAD for the management and sharing of knowledge, information and experience in agriculture and rural development in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region. ESDU has hosted the network since 2015, and designed and launched a new portal in March 2016, that is accessible to all users. ESDU is aligning KariaNet activities with Local Food Systems while contextualizing success cases and partnering with regional and international networks and centers in the region. In collaboration with The Strategic Partnership Initiative (SPI), ESDU held (July 5, 2017) a workshop at AUB entitled *Promoting rural development through access to finance, ICT and Technology*.

Capacity Building

Reducing Vulnerability of Syrian Refugees and the Lebanese in Lebanon - in collaboration with the Near East Foundation, ESDU conducted a series of capacity building workshops for about 170 Syrian refugees and Lebanese, in support of the development of home-based productive activities and small businesses related to agricultural production and food processing. The areas of intervention are spread between (1) Minieh and Berqayel (North Governorate); and (2) Taanayel (Bekaa Governorate). A set of interactive training workshops were be delivered between May and September 2017, covering topics including food safety, production of soft cheeses, catering services, sun drying vegetables, fruits & herbs, and recipe standardization & labeling. A total of 5 workshops were conducted to date in Berqayel, Akkar, and Taanayel, Bekkaa where enthusiastic groups of Syrian & Lebanese women were trained in developing home-based production lines of sweets, cheeses, mouneh etc.



Development

GHATA: Bringing Education to Informal Tented Settlements - This project, implemented in partnership with Kayany Foundation and the Center for Civic Engagement and Community Service (CCECS) and funded by Reach Out to Asia – Qatar Foundation, aims to scale up AUB-CCECS GHATA intervention to assemble two school campuses. The goal is to provide Community Based Education (CBE) for refugee children, including

child protection services and nutritional assistance. The ESDU team consulted on the establishment of 2 school kitchenettes within the campuses and led a capacity building program for the female cooks in each school. Topics included food safety, healthy nutrition, and menu development. Throughout the year, students received a variety of healthy snacks that improved their dietary diversity and access to nutritious food.

Building the Food Security and Economic Resilience of Syrian Refugees and Vulnerable Members of their Host Communities in Beirut and Lebanon The program aims to build food security and economic resilience of Syrian refugees and vulnerable members of their host communities, enhancing survival skills and prosperity in the face of decreasing international assistance. The project is in collaboration with NEF and YMCA; ESDU is responsible for the implementation of the urban agriculture component of the project. To date, urban agricultural kits were designed by ESDU and provided to 40 if the 150 families in Bourj Hammoud, Dawra and Nabaa areas. Capacity building sessions were delivered to project beneficiaries, enabling them to produce healthy food on their balconies, windows and roofs.

Souk aal Souk – Farmers' Market held monthly in FAFS, gathers small-scale farmers and food producers from around the country.



Academic programs

RCODE Master of Sciences Program in Rural Community Development - ESDU continues to host and support RCODE in the practicum course, providing graduate students with internships in various ESDU projects (see details in the RCODE report).

AUB 150th Celebrations

Arab Women: Keepers of the Land: ESDU 15th Anniversary celebrations - ESDU celebrated its 15th anniversary, paying tribute to partners and friends who have left their marks in the field of rural development world by advancing the role of women to preserve their lands and heritage.

Fundraising Event

ESDU organized its first fund raising event, screening the film 3000 Nights, by Ms. Mai Mari, on March 31, 2017, in celebration of Land Day and in collaboration with the Palestinian Culture Club at AUB and ULYP (Unite Lebanon Youth Project). Over 150 people attended, contributing to the support of a Palestinian /Arab graduate student enrolled in the RCODE program.

- AGRI finalized the revision of the new BS in Agriculture program to conform with ABET requirements in collaboration with an expert consultant recruited for this purpose
- AGRI reviewed applicants and took preliminary decisions on 5 vacant positions at the professorial rank in Plant Breeding and Biotechnology, Agroecology, Animal Biotechnology, Horticulture and Animal Physiology. The final decisions will be taken following interviews, in person and via skype
- Dr. Abou Jawdah served as acting chairman during the Spring and Summer 2017;
 Dr. Hamadeh was chairman during the Fall 2016 semester
- Dr. Gumataw Abebe joined the Department as Assistant Professor in Agribusiness Marketing and Management

Department of Landscape Design and Ecosystem Management (LDEM)

Highlights

The department's vision is to be a leading academic institution, offering graduate and undergraduate degrees in Landscape Architecture and related fields in the Arab World; to graduate socially responsible landscape architects who are responsive to place, culture, and the natural and ecological needs of the region.

LDEM Department has eight full-time faculty members and offers two programs: Bachelor of Landscape Architecture (BLA) with a Diploma of Ingenieur Agricole, and Masters of Sciences in Ecosystem Management (ECOM), part of the Interfaculty Graduate Environmental Sciences Program (IGESP). In 2016-2017, 87 BLA undergraduate students and 7 MSc ECOM students were registered; LDEM graduated 21 BLA students and 1 MSc student.

Department academic activities

Achievements during AY 2016-2017:

- Master of Landscape Architecture (MLA) program: The department, through M.
 G. Trovato (Chair of committee) revised and is finalizing the draft document for an
 MLA proposal to be submitted to the Faculty's Graduate Studies Committee (GSC)
 during AY 2017-2018
- Program Learning Outcomes (PLOs) and Course Learning Outcomes (CLOs) assessment: the master list of the PLO/CLO for the program was reviewed in December 2015, and identified short-comings in the program that led to program revisions, expected to be finalized during AY 2017-2018. Direct and indirect assessment of programs and course learning outcomes were conducted in December 2016 January 2017, and during April May 2017. These assessments were led by R. Zurayk and assisted by departmental research assistant S. Youssef
- Curriculum adjustments: LDEM was engaged in a process of curriculur adjustment
 following the program review and assessment results. On April 13, 2016, BLA
 curriculum adjustments were voted on by LDEM and approved by the FAFS
 Academic Curriculum Committee (ACC). Changes became effective Fall 2016 for
 new incoming students at that itme. The changes were mostly organizational and
 do not include any radical modifications
- Preparation for BLA program review in AY 2017-2018, Self Study report: LDEM started preparations for an external program review of BLA in Spring 2017 upon graduation of the first cohort of the program. The review is necessary to obtain final approval and registration at NYSED. A copy of the external review and the University's response to the review will be submitted to NYSED once completed. This effort is led by Y. Abunnasr, assisted by consultant B. Ibrahim and significant contributions by all LDEM members and administrative staff. The program reviewers' visit to the department is expected in Spring 2018
- LDEM Student/Faculty Meeting: LDEM held (October 13, 2016) its first student/ faculty meeting (led by R. Zurayk and N. Al-Akl) for AY 2016-2017. The latest updates to the facility and the curriculum were discussed and an opportunity provided for students and faculty to discuss issues of interest

- Promotion and Reappointment Criteria for LDEM faculty: The department's final proposal (approved by LDEM, November 25, 2016) regarding *Promotion, Tenure and Reappointment Criteria and Procedures* was sent to the FAFS Dean for review in January 2017. The document is the outcome of a long, painstaking process in response to various issues around the evaluation of research and teaching in design specialties such as landscape architecture. These issues were highlighted in the external program review. Every member of LDEM played a crucial role in developing the document, under the leadership of Dr. Maya Nabhani, Director of Continuous Academic Improvement at FAFS. Seven drafts were produced; criteria are detailed and result from a benchmarking process to which seven universities from USA, Canada and Australia were compared. The proposal was approved by the FAFS Advisory Committee on January 11, 2017. The document was presented, in a faculty meeting, for review and approval on January 23, 2017, and comments and feedback were received. Since then, a FAFS faculty committee for tenure and promotion is following up on behalf of all FAFS departments
- Nehme Moujaess Landscape Architecture Award: FAFS faculty members and staff gathered (March 24, 2017) to honor and thank alumnus Nehme Moujaess for his generous pledge to establish the Nehme Moujaess Student Award in Landscape Architecture (\$ 25,000 US). FAFS Dean Hwalla expressed her gratitude and appreciation to Mr. Moujaess for his support of the faculty and LDEM, noting that this was the first time that LDEM students have received such an opportunity. LDEM chairperson R. Zurayk also recognized Mr. Moujaess' generosity and support, noting that Mr. Moujaess received an MS in Soils and Mechanization (1995) and a BS in Agriculture (1992). He has provided LDEM students a unique opportunity for a paid internship at Terraverde Landscaping Company in Dubai, UAE, which he co-owns. The Nehme Moujaess Student Award in Landscape Architecture will be granted annually, in a formal ceremony to the most deserving senior Landscape Architecture students, as selected by the Department and based on their final year project, to be aligned with FAFS vision and mission. Awardees may also be granted a "first look" placement and recruitment consideration at Terraverde. The department, with approval of Mr. Moujaess, determined the criteria for the selection of the best project effective May 2017. The jury of committee members included: R. Zuravk (representing N. Mouiaess, a voting member), Y. Abunnasr (representing LDEM and a voting member), Abdel Halim Jabr (representing the landscape profession and a voting member), and N. Al-Akl (final year project instructor and FYP coordinator, a non-voting member). The jury assisted in clarifying any matters pertaining to the shortlisetd projects
- Lara Karen Baitarian, first LDEM student to receive the Nehme Moujaess Student Award in Landscape Architecture, established in 2017. Final year LDEM student, Ms. Lara Karen Baitarian, was selected as the most deserving senior Landscape Architecture student based on her final year project, aligned with FAFS vision and mission. Ms. Baitarian was also granted the "first look" placement and recruitment consideration at Terraverde, Dubai. The department, with the approval of Mr. Moujaess, set the criteria for selection of the best project of 2017. Four candidates were shortlisted and presented with certificates of recognition; these

were (alphabetical order) Mariam Bazzi, Rani Chamseddine, Loubna Saksouk Dit Sasso and Jawad Souaid. Mr. Moujaess and Dean Hwalla (FAFS) presented the Nehme Moujaess Student Award in Landscape Architecture to Ms. Baitarian during the annual FAFS Graduate Reception (May 22, 2017) at Le Bristol Hotel. FAFS used the occasion to celebrate the achievements of all its graduating students and awardees

- Renewal of Chairperson: R. Zurayk was appointed as Chair of the Department of Landscape Design and Ecosystem Management (LDEM) for an additional threeyear term beginning January 27, 2017
- Visiting Scholar: The Food Security Program at FAFS and LDEM invited Professor John Anthony (Tony) Allan as URB visiting scholar for the term fall 2016. Professor Allan is a leading water expert, globally. Allan heads the London Water Research Group at King's College London (KCL) and the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS) at the University of London. On November 23, 2016, Professor Allan spoke to FAFS about food-water security in the Middle East, addressing more than 60 external guests, students, faculty, staff, and experts in related fields. Professor Allan shed light on water and food security challenges in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) and analyzed the current and future status and role of water in the region. Sharing his global perspective, Professor Allan highlighted the role of the agri-food sector in achieving water security in the 21st century
- **New Faculty:** Ms. Beata Dreksler joined the department as a visiting assistant professor of landscape architecture (focus: landscape design and site construction) effective August 2016 for a the period August 2016 to August 2018. Dr. Dreksler successfully defended her PhD dissertation in July 2017. On August 28, 2017, LDEM voted (4:0:0) to extend the appointment of visiting assistant professor Beata Dreksler for an additional year
- Faculty Promotions: Y. Abunnasr submitted his file for promotion to the rank of Associate Professor to the FAFS Dean's office in January 2017. LDEM's recommendation and vote on his promotion file was submitted to the Dean's Office on February 27, 2017. In June 2017 the BOT approved the promotion of Dr. Yaser Abunnasr to the rank of Associate Professor of Landscape Architecture

Agence Taktyk responds to heterogeneous and complex challenges at the intersection of landscape, infrastructure and the city, the practice acts as a mediator of complex transformation processes.

Involvement in interdisciplinary and interfaculty activities

Active involvement in university wide centers, programs, and activities by faculty

- Lebanese Landscape Association (LELA): two full time LDEM faculty members (N. Al-Akl and M. Trovato) continue to be part of LELA activities lead by Associate Faculty J. Makhzoumi
- Initiative for Green Roof Research Group: S. Talhouk continues to lead the initiative
 to launch a research group focused on urban and sustainable greening, to turn
 AUB into a showcase in this field. M. Fabian is also involved in this research
- Initiative for AUB Botanic Garden: the department and S. Talhouk continue to lead this university wide initiative. Launched in May 2016 as part of AUB's 150th anniversary celebrations, the committee includes 25 additional members from multiple faculties and units at AUB and AUB friends
- **Presidential tree planting:** AUB botanics, led by S. Talhouk and AUB's Neighborhood Initiative, organized a presidential tree planting event on March 27, 2017. President Fadlo Khuri and COO Ramin Sedehi marked AUB 150th anniversary and reaffirmed the university's responsibility as a custodian of its natural environment by planting a large oak tree next to Assembly Hall. The ceremony was attended by VP for Advancement Dr. Imad Baalbaki, senior administrators, faculty members, staff, and students. First grade students from six nearby schools joined President Khuri, each planting a cedar seed in a pot to take home. In an unique, interactive learning experience, the students toured the campus and learned about its flora. The schools participating were International College, American Community School, Saint Mary's Orthodox College, College Protestant Français, the National Protestant College, and Jaber Ahmad El Sabbah public school. Chaired by S. Talhouk, AUBotanic assumes an advisory role to the President and supervisory and planning roles in the development and implementation of projects aligned with the campus master plan directives and in coordination with the COO. Talhouk explained that a botanical garden provides both leisure and learning. Each plant on campus has been identified and AUBotanic expects to open the campus as a space in which people can come to enjoy the greenery
- AUB Botanical Garden Reception: S. Talhouk organized a reception at the AUB botanical garden (May 18, 2017) under the Banyan tree next to AUB's Observatory to experience the essence of nature and learn how the AUB campus is becoming a botanical garden. The event ended with a walk through AUB's first woodland trail

Department outreach activities and community involvement

- Parking Day: AUB Landscape Architecture Society (coordinator: N. Al-Akl) organized
 the yearly event on September 16, 2016 in Hamra, Main Street. PARK(ing) Day is an
 annual open-source, global event where citizens, artists and activists collaborate
 to temporarily transform metered parking spaces into "PARK(ing)" spaces:
 temporary public spaces and with the goal of calling attention to the need for more
 open spaces in urban areas. The event attempts to generate critical debate around
 how public space is created and allocated, and to improve the quality of urban
 human habitats
- Annual Plant Sale: S. Talhouk, M. Fabian and LDEM I students organized, as part
 of an experiential learning session in the introductory horticulture course (LDEM
 211), the department's annual plant sale in front of AUB's West Hall on April 7,
 2017. Sales generated will be added to the department's revolving fund to sustain
 experiential learning activities
- **Gardening Allotment for faculty:** AUB community had the opportunity to produce their own vegetables on campus, in allotments prepared for them in the greenhouse area, during the Fall term 2016
- Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between AUB and Sin El Fil Municipality: in March 2016, an MOU was drafted between AUB and Sin El Fil municipality with the common understanding and broad objective of promoting a mutually beneficial collaboration in matters of mutual interest related to urban landscape and implementation of public spaces. The MOU was finalized during March 2017, signed by the FAFS Dean and AUB Provost, and sent to the Sin El Fil municipality for signature. The initiative, led by M.G. Trovato, is now in effect
- LDEM Students Win First Prize in the Arts and Humanities Category at IBDAA 2017: On April 27, 2017, LDEM students Ghida Sbeity, Hussein Ghazi, and Farah Bou Ghanem, supervised by LDEM Faculty S. Talhouk, won 1st place in the Arts and Humanities category of the annual international biodiversity Day at IBDAA event, marking the 4th consecutive year that LDEM students have taken first place in the category. The students received the Innovative Design Award for implementing creative solutions for the visually impaired. The event, organized by the Nature Conservation Center (NCC) at AUB, offers students the opportunity to participate in an academic poster forum and to be evaluated by experts in the field. This year, the NCC commemorated biological diversity in the theme "Sustainable Solutions to Our Environmental Problems"
- AUB's Off Campus Smoking Areas Design Competition: The Tobacco-Free Task
 Force, in collaboration with the AUB Neighborhood Initiative, launched a student
 competition in which 15 groups registered to participate in the Off Campus
 Smoking Areas Design Competition. A total of 37 students, in majors including
 architecture, landscape architecture, engineering, graphic design, and nutrition
 competed. Students developed sustainable eco-design solutions for real life
 problems, including cigarette recycling points off campus that are intended to

help keep the sidewalks clean and the environment green as AUB transforms into Tobacco-free AUB in 2018. Target users include the AUB community (students, faculty, staff, visitors, neighbors, and the general public). A prize of \$500 was awarded to each of three winning projects on September 15, 2017. M. Trovato was among the jury members of the design competition; Marwa Darazi, LDEM III, won first prize. The group winners for second and third place included students from LDEM II

- **Garden show 2017:** LDEM students designed and implemented the departmental stand at the 14th annual Beirut garden show spring festival, *Colors in the Garden*. Under the supervision and coordination of LDEM faculty members M. Fabian and B. Dreksler, the annual event took place May 23-27, 2017 at the Beirut Hippodrome. The department's stand was very popular with both adults and children, and was the most popular stand among the three participating universities
- School visits to the department: as part of their outreach activities, a campus tree tour was organized by M. Fabian (greenhouse supervisor) for around 40 school students from the International College (IC) and their accompanying administrative staff. 160 students visited the greenhouse area to learn about plants and planting practices. In addition, M. Fabian and Louis Wegman (Khaldeh) were invited to ACS in April 2017, offering sessions on urban agriculture and green roofs, respectively
- Heritage Watch Day Dalieh of Raouche and Heneine Palace: A group of selected projects developed by LDEM students in the Cultural Landscape Design studio course (LDEM 204), were exhibited in the Glass Hall of the Ministry of Tourism, as part of the Heritage Watch Day activities
- LDEM holiday potluck at Reynolds Hall: LDEM department invited its full- and part-time faculty and staff and the FAFS Dean's office staff to a potluck reception on December 21, 2016 in celebration of the holiday season



Space and Facilites

- LDEM students' relocation to Reynolds Hall: LDEM completed the relocation of students to the Building in September 2016 under the supervision of Y. Abunnasr and allowing it to meet ASLA (American Society of Landscape Architects) accreditation requirements and in compliance with NYSED registration
- FAFS Dean holds Coffee break at Reynolds Hall: Dean N. Hwalla hosted a special
 coffee break for FAFS faculty and staff on September 23, 2016, at Reynolds Hall.
 The event welcomed new FAFS faculty members Dr. Martin Keulertz, visiting
 professor at Food Security and Ms. Beata Dreksler, Visiting Assistant Professor of
 Landscape Architecture, and celebrated the materialization of space allocations
 for LDEM, as requested by NYSED, and the relocation of the RCODE, FSP and AGBU
 programs to Reynolds
- LDEM student printing facilities improvement: During Fall 2016, a proposal to advance student printing facilities and options at the department was prepared and presented by N. Al-Akl and N. Modad. The proposal was based on student requests. After investigation, it was determined to install a paid quota, network, color, multi-functional printer at Reynolds LDEM Student Lounge. The FAFS Dean's office purchased the printer and LDeM student plotter, previously located at AREC, was placed, temporarily, in the fourth year studio (its used is restricted to LDEM III and LDEM IV to avoid disturbance to final year students and studio classes). LDEM received approval from the Provost and FPDU to use part of an outdoor room at Reynolds, currently undergoing renovation into an outdoor model room for students. Once ready, the plotter and other student equipment will be relocated there
- Capital budget equipment: In July 2017, the department received approval for AUB funding in the amount of 43,000USD to purchase a laser cutting and engraving machine for model making. Delivery is expected in Fall 2017, for installation in the newly acquired and renovated outdoor model room at Reynolds Hall
- Capital budget renovations: In July 2016, the department requested and received approval that the Dean's office reallocate the previously approved capital budget for rehabilitating part of the greenhouse to the education fund of LDEM. The reason for this request was that the bid prices exceeded the LDEM allocated budget. The reallocation to the educational fund meets two primary objectives: 1) rehabilitation of part of the greenhouse area per the original scope of work, and 2) provide a student hands-on educational experience directly connected to their course work. The end date of the project was extended by the comptroller's office to end of June 2018. Y. Abunnasr completed the project design in 2015 and the first phase went to bid via FPDU with prices beyond the allocated budget. The project was rebid via the Physical Plant, and prices offered were more reasonable: the winning bid totaled of \$47,000 including VAT. The available budget, secured from the original project capital budget and LDEM maintenance budget, was \$42,920. The Chair requested FAFS Dean Hwalla to cover the remaining \$4,100 necessary for project implementation. Current Acting Dean A. Olabi approved the request and provided the amount to allow project implementation

Student Activities

Organized by LDEM students through classes or the Landscape Architecture Student Society (advisor N. Al-Akl):

- **Student community & visibility events:** students participated in community events including the Dahlieh preservation campaign launch and exhibition
- Workshops: Rami Al Outa, Platform Configuration Engineer at ESRI and former LDEM student, offered a GIS workshop on October 2, 2016. The workshop introduced new methods to create accurate maps of student field sites using cellular phones. It introduced techniques for the collection of 'non-physical data' and taught how to search for readily available online info relating to landscape layers of Lebanon (organized by N. Al-Akl)
- Christmas and Valentines' day event: Social activities highlighting the presence
 of the Landscape Architecture Student Society within the larger AUB student
 community aimed at enhancing visibility at AUB included, as part of its annual
 Christmas events, a gingerbread cookie sale, November 30 to December 2, 2016.
 The society also organized flower and cookie sales for Valentines' day
- First year students welcoming event: The idea of an acquaintance party was
 re-introduced in an effort encourage first year students to become involved in
 department life and student interact with and receive support from students
 across the different years

Faculty, Students and Alumni Recognition

- LDEM Students and Faculty Receive Honorable Mention: Two LDEM alumni, Joude Mabsout and Rim Hazimeh, LDEM faculty M. G. Trovato, and part-time faculty B. El-Ariss received a special honorable mention at the International Prize of University Projects in Schools of Architecture and Landscape for their 3rd year project (LDEM 228) 'Sarafand Informal Settlement Landscape project', aimed to facilitate community, children, and youth interaction through the design of open spaces. At a second activity, the International Operative Landscape Workshop 'E-Scape: Refugee settlement,' (May 2015) included the Al Tyliani Informal Settlement Landscape project, in which 15 students and 10 international professors spent eight days creating public spaces. LDEM received a special mention for dealing with current conflicts and seeking convenient solutions. The International Exhibition of University Projects in Schools of Architecture and Landscape is part of the International Biennial of Landscape Barcelona, Spain, which has always expressed its desire to intently study and discuss landscape interventions. The jury made several selection based on project originality, methodological rigor, and potential work. On September 28, 2016, the jury met at the School of Architecture of Barcelona and discussed the 12 finalist projects. LDEM, led by M. G. Trovato, presented the results of the two projects conducted during the 2014-2015 academic year, under the topic Landscape in Emergency
- LDEM Alumnus and Faculty Receive 3rd place in CIU Habitat International Competition (sponsored by HABITAT III): Team co-leaders Dr. Yaser Abunnasr, Dr.

Mona Fawaz and Habib Debs (Practicing Architect/Urban Designer, URBI) responded to the competition theme *Challenges of Marginal Habitat in the Contemporary Southern Globe: Resilient Communities* with their project titled 'Flood Pulse: From Threat to Opportunity: Capitalizing on Water Flows in Guasmo Sur,' winning 3rd third place. Their project responded to the need to resettle informal settlements dwellers in the city of Guasmo Sur (Ecuador), where vulnerable communities, living in mangrove swamps experiences regular flooding. AUB student team members included MUPP/MUD students Israa Darwish and Diala Makki, LDEM alumna Nour Farhat, and fifth year architecture student Louai Kaakani

- United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) 50th Anniversary Time Capsule Competition Top 5 Honorary distinction: Thea Maroun (2nd year student, studio LDEM 246), received the UNIDO certificate of appreciation at the UNIDO 50th Anniversary Youth Competition *Envisaging Our Sustainable Future*. Her video was designated by the Review Committee as one of the five best in the international sustainable design competition. The event, organized by UNIDO in cooperation with AIESEC (Activating the leadership potential of young people) took place in Vienna, during November, 2016
- LDEM Alumni Project Wins Public Spaces Category, Lebanese Architect Awards: FAFS LDEM alumn Zeina Kronfol (2006) and Pamela Haydamous (2010), won the Public Spaces category of the 2017 Lebanese Architect Awards for their project Karantina Play Garden: Space for Encounters. The Federation of Lebanese Engineers organized the Lebanese Architectural Awards festival February 16, 17, 18 at Biel in Beirut. The event was endorsed by International Union of Architects, Federation of Arab Engineers, Organization of Arab Architects and the Union of Mediterranean Architects. Its aim was to promote the exchange of ideas, knowhow and relations, and to stimulate new and profitable business opportunities. 36 leading Lebanese architectural practices from around the world participated in the prestigious competition, representing some of the most significant projects in the international architectural scene. Through their valuable project, Kronfol and Haydamous regained, for Karantina, its long lost value in terms of space and promoting encounters between communities, cultures, and generations under the theme of reconciliation
- **LDEM Student Shortlisted for WLA Award:** the Final Year Project of LDEM student, Loubna Sasso, was shortlisted for the World Landscape Architecture (WLA) Award, a prestigious international award that includes students from all over the world. Loubna, through her project *Tyre's Interactive Waterfront*, successfully made it to the top 11 projects (Primary advisor: part-time lecturer S. Frem; Secondary advisors: N. Al-Akl and B. Dreksler)
- Archiprix 2017: the graduation project of Tamar Sarkissian (LDEM, May 2015, advised by Y. Abunnasr) was selected for Archiprix 2017, a biennial, international event presenting the worlds' best graduation projects, as selected by universities and colleges teaching architecture, urban design and landscape architecture across the world. All projects are included in a major exhibition and a catalogue of the projects is published. The workshop was held at CEPT University, Ahmedabad, India, in February

- LDEM Student Honored at AUB's Annual Athletes Night Ceremony: During its annual Athletes Night ceremony, AUB University Sports honored 45 top athletes of 2016-2017. 2nd year Landscape Architecture student Tara Kanj, holder of the Lebanese record for the 300m-indoor race, was recognized in the New Record Awards category
- LDEM Professor Receives Teaching Excellence Award: Y. Abunnasr and N. Al-Akl were nominated for this year's AUB's Teaching Excellence Award, announced in May 2017 ceremony celebrating the awardees and in the presence of President Fadlo Khuri, FAFS Dean Nahla Hwalla, and other prominent AUB leaders. The committee presented this significant award to Dr. Yaser Abunnasr, FAFS assistant professor at LDEM. Dr. Abunnasr, the first FAFS professor to win the prestigious Teaching Excellence Award, competed with an extremely strong pool of accomplished contestants.
- Lebanese Architects Awards: N. Al-Akl served as the landscape architecture
 consultant on the award winning project Byblos Town Hall, lead by Hashim Sarkis
 Studios. The project won the award for best mixed-use project during the ceremony
 at BIEL on February 16-18, 2017

Teaching

Courses Offered

During AY 2016-17 the Department offered: 15 undergraduate courses, 1 graduate course during the Fall, 15 undergraduate courses and 2 graduate courses during the Spring, and 5 undergraduate courses and one internship course during the Summer.


