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### Overview:

"Poetry is when an emotion has found its thought and the thought has found words."

-Robert Frost

Reading and understanding poetry can be more demanding and frustrating than other forms of literature – but it doesn't have to be. Poems, whether they are short or long, whether they are written in free or rhyming verse, can be powerful enough to evoke complex emotions and stimulate the imagination and intellect. This course will focus on the works of poets of various nationalities and span across different historical periods. Through close reading and class discussion, students will learn how to identify different stylistic devices used in poetry as well as various poetic forms.

## **Student Learning Outcomes:**

After completing this course, students will be able to:

- Identify the various elements of poetry, such as tone, form, genre, imagery and other forms of figurative language, theme, etc.
- Recognize rhyme scheme, meter, syntax and other elements of poetic structure.
- Identify a variety of forms and genres of poetry.
- Read, understand and respond to poetry.

#### Textbook:

Readings will be distributed weekly via email. It is your responsibility to download and bring them to class.

### **Assignments:**

Assessed work will take the form of a weekly response journal, one mid-term exam and a final exam. There is also a participation component to your final grade.

### **Grading:**

Journal (25%) + Mid-term (25%) + Final (30%) + Participation (20%) = Grade (100)

The substantial "participation" segment expresses the importance of continuous in-class engagement as well as private study for developing your critical approach to poetry. This

component of the grade will take into account punctuality, attention to colleagues and instructor, evidence of preparation, and, above all, frequency and thoughtfulness of discussion contribution.

#### **Policies**

DO bring to class: Readings, paper, writing implement.

DO NOT bring to class: Switched-on mobile phone or other electronic devices.
