Course Description

This course will cover the major theories and controversies around the concept of abnormal behavior, its assessment and diagnosis. We will cover most of the psychological disorders seen in adulthood, their symptomatology, causal theories, risk factors and treatments.

- 1) to demonstrate knowledge of the various approaches to assessment and diagnosis of psychological disorders (PLO 5b,2a)
- 2) to demonstrate knowledge of the various theories and treatment approaches to psychological disorders (PLO5b,2a)
- 3) to differentiate empirically validated psychotherapy from pseudo-scientific psychotherapy (PLO1c)
- 4) to demonstrate an attitude of critical thinking concerning the process of assessment, diagnosis and treatment (PLO2a,b,c)
- 5) to understand the role of social, environmental and cultural factors when assessing, diagnosing and treating adults. (PLO2b)
- 6) to gain a solid knowledge base in the ethical standards of clinical research and practice (PLO4b,c)
- 7) to effectively and fluently communicate psychological knowledge and critical thinking skills through writing assignments and oral discussions. (PLO6a,b)

Class Format and Environment

Classes will be made up of lectures, activities, and group discussions.

Class time has been designed to elaborate on reading material, to apply it to real case examples, and to stimulate critical thinking and discussion. Classes will *not* be a point by point summary of the reading.

Readings are assigned in advance (see schedule at the end of the syllabus). Students are expected to read the material before class. Modifications to the schedule and other aspects of the syllabus will be made available on Moodle.

Students are strongly encouraged to express their thoughts, opinions and ideas, and to be open-minded and respectful in allowing others to express their thoughts, opinions and ideas, even if they are different from theirs.

Any informal and constructive feedback throughout the semester on how to improve the class or its content is warmly welcomed. It is important to me that classes are useful and interesting to all students.

Cell phone and laptop policy

I respectfully request no cell phone usage in class, as well as no laptop or tablet use unless related to the class (i.e. note taking). If you need to leave your phone on for personal reasons, please do let me know before the class and step out of the class if you need to take a call.

Self-care

The discussion of mental illness and related experiences and difficulties can be triggering and some may, at times, find it distressing. Evaluation Methods

Final grades will be based on 3 exams and a final written assignment. Grades will be calculated as follows and graded out of 100:

5% - Attendance
5% - Participation
25% - Exam 1
20% - Exam 2
20% - Exam 3
25% - Written assignment

Attendance and participation. Students are required to attend all classes for their entirety, and to arrive on time. If you are unable to attend class due to valid reasons or unforeseen circumstances, such as illness, you are expected to provide formal evidence of your reason for absence (e.g. a doctor's note from the University Infirmary). Attendance makes up 5% of your overall grade.

Participation makes up a further 5% and includes participation in class and group discussions as well as listening to lecture material and discussion and refraining from activity likely to disrupt class (e.g. private conversations and whispering).

Exams. Exams are based on the core reading and material discussed in class. They are not cumulative. All exams are conducted during class time. When an exam is conducted on Moodle you will be informed ahead of time of the location. Any students with accommodations, such as extra time, must contact me at least 1 week before the exam in order to make arrangements. Make-up exams will only be arranged if you provide formal evidence of a valid reason for your absence. Attendance makes up 5% of your grade.

Written assignment. The written assignment is worth 25% of the overall grade. Details about the assignment will be provided in class.

Late submissions will incur a 2-mark penalty for every day the assignment is late, unless the student can provide evidence of extenuating circumstances in which case a new deadline can be negotiated. Submissions that exceed the word count will not be read past the word limit, with no re-submission possible.
