Course description: In this course, students will learn about the human sensory systems of vision, hearing, smell and taste, with an emphasis on vision and hearing. We will trace how external stimuli (light, sound, odors), are encoded by sensory receptors and transformed into perceptual experiences. The course covers the physiology of sensory organs, neural pathways, and perceptual phenomena from everyday life (e.g., illusions, adaptation), that illuminate how sensory input is represented in the brain. Students will also learn about the methods used in sensory science to measure, quantify and understand human perception.

Learning outcomes:

- 1. Describe the physiology and mechanisms of sensation using written explanations, graphs and diagrams
- 2. Differentiate the methods of measurement used in sensory science
- 3. Relate common perceptual experiences to neural mechanisms
- 4. Appreciate the precision and range of human sensory systems

Course policy: Please be on time to class and read the assigned chapters during the week of the lectures. Attendance is mandatory and will be taken with a sign-up sheet.
