### POST STUDY ABROAD CHECKLIST

#### TRANSCRIPT PROCESSING

- Request to have your transcript sent to OIP in one of the following formats
  - Hard copy official transcripts should be mailed to the following OIP Mailing Address: AUB, Office of International Programs, West Hall, 3rd Floor, Room 320, 1107 2020, Beirut, Lebanon
  - Electronic Official transcripts: If your host university only issues electronic transcripts, these must be certified by an official of the University with a certificate provided by a recognized security vendor or be encrypted and only accessible to the recipient and should be emailed to aubabroad@aub.edu.lb
- Complete the **Online Study Abroad Testimonial Survey**.
- Once you complete the survey, OIP will upload your transcript on the petition system and send your transcript to the Office of the Registrar for the credit transfer.
- If you experience any delays in getting the credits transferred even after completing all of the above steps, please consult with the Office of the Registrar and/or your faculty.

#### **ACADEMICS**

- Keep copies of syllabi, papers and exams you have from abroad.
- If you think you might want professors from your semester abroad to write you recommendations for graduate school or be a reference for job applications in the future, talk to them now.
- Meet with your AUB academic advisor to discuss how your courses were abroad and how you can incorporate any new ideas or interests with your academic plan at AUB.



Attend a Virtual Post Study Abroad Gathering hosted by OIP.

- Volunteer with OIP to promote study abroad and assist AUB
- Apply to the OIP Mentor Program, Volunteer to guide new international students at AUB Update your resume to include your new international experience, get tips at the Post Study
- Find creative outlets to share your experiences from abroad become an OIP Mentor, talk to prospective study abroad students, join a cultural club on campus, etc.
- Email your favorite photos from abroad to OIP at aubabroad@aub.edu.lb
- Share and post your pictures on OIP's social media outlets and #AUBgoesabroad
- Visit the counseling center if you are having trouble with reverse culture shock and re-entry.
- Talk to OIP if you are interested in studying abroad again!

## **REFLECTION ON STUDY ABROAD EXPERIENCE**

Studying abroad can be an incredibly enriching and transformative experience. It offers the opportunity to immerse oneself in a new culture, language, and educational system, fostering personal growth and expanding one's global perspective.

#### **UNPACK YOUR EMOTIONS**

 Returnees feel so many things in re-entry! Don't minimize your feelings or sweep them under the rug. Instead, find an outlet for expressing your positive and negative feelings in a healthy way.
 A few examples: writing in a journal, participating in re-entry meetings, talking to your study abroad advisor.

#### **REFLECT ON YOUR IDENTITY**

 Most returnees feel changed – eventransformed – after study abroad and are disappointed when friends and family at home don't readily notice those changes. What can help is reflecting on who you were before you went abroad, who you were while you were abroad, and who you are now. In what ways have you remained the same? In what ways have you changed? What did you learn while abroad? What (and who) is important to you now?

#### **REST, REFLECT, AND REFUEL**

 Because that's exactly what you need to do in order to continue your lifelong global journey.

### CAREER AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- Studying Abroad is an incredible experience which puts you at an advantage when applying to internships and jobs because companies are looking for global citizens with international experiences. However, it's not enough to describe your semester(s) as "great" or a "life-changing experience". Employers want to know how and why this experience was life-changing.
- Articulating the skills you gained and how they relate to your career
  makes all the difference when speaking to potential employers. Make sure
  to relate these skills and competencies to the career you are interested in
  pursuing. Also, use concrete examples to illustrate how these skills were
  gained and practice saying them out loud.

#### STEP #1 REFLECT ON YOUR EXPERIENCE

 Group Projects, met new people from different cultures, spoke a different language, lived/travelled alone for the first time, faced some challenges, volunteered, interned at a company...

# STEP #2 WHAT SKILLS DID THIS EXPERIENCE PROVIDE YOU WITH?

• Flexibility, adaptability, problem solving skills, decision making skills, being a team player, building relationships in a multicultural setting, thinking outside the box, networking, improving language skills, learning how to converse in a foreign language in its country of origin, self-reliance...

#### STEP #3


